THE HARVEST IS PAST

"The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved" (Jeremiah 8:20).

Year's end is a time when we think of the days that have passed and we also have a look toward the future. As we look back we find so many disappointments and failures that we have to live with. We sing in that hymn, "I look not back; God knows the fruitless efforts, the wasted hours, the sinning, the regrets." Most of the time we would rather forget the past and ignore these disappointments and failures. Somehow they seem to keep showing up and haunting us even if we would rather forget them. This is the part Satan never wants us to see when he tempts us to sin. He shows us only the momentary pleasure or reward and does not show the remorse or regret or continuing results of sin that God warns us may carry over into the third and fourth generations of those who reject Him. The psalmist, in Psalm 73, tells how he was looking at these outward, material blessings of those outside of Christ and had almost fallen into the terrible sin of envy of the rich. Then he went into the sanctuary of God and there he saw the end of the wicked, how God has set them in slippery places and casts them down to destruction.

The worst thing a person could say at year's end is "the year is over and I am still not saved." Each year we have a time of God's grace on this earth. God is not slow concerning His promises but is longsuffering toward us not wanting any to perish but that everyone may come to repentance (II Peter 3:9). Thus, when

a year ends and one still does not have peace with God, that person has wasted another year of God's grace. This means that the time of God's visitation, when the day of grace is over, is that much closer than a year ago. It also means that if that person has heard God's word and has continued to reject it in his heart, he has further hardened his heart to God's call and is now less able to heed that call whenever he may hear it again. The warmth of God's gracious call to man in the Gospel hardens the clay of the heart that rejects that call as well as melts the ice in the heart that has been cold toward God but willing to let that call slowly lead it to repentance. How heart-warming it was recently to see a retired couple come to faith in Jesus Christ together in an evangelistic meeting.

God, however, warned way back in Genesis 6:3 "My Spirit shall not always strive with man." The hard human heart wants to put off the acceptance of God's call to a personal, living faith. Felix' response to Paul's witness of faith in Christ was, "Go thy way for this time: when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee" (Acts 24:25). Scripture does not record that he ever called for Paul again so that he could accept Christ by faith personally into his life. So close and yet so far. "The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved."

Has another year come and gone and you are not yet saved?

All of us in looking back on the past year find many disappointments, failures, sin and regrets. Looking for-

ward, in itself, is no answer to the past. Many look into the future with fear and foreboding on the things that are happening in the world. In this new year where can I look to find hope and peace and joy? "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool" (Isaiah 1:18). Jesus died on the cross so we can come to Him as we are, with all our sins and disappointments. failures and comings. When we come and confess these to Him they are forgiven and cleansed. Thus our slate from the past year is wiped clean in God's eyes and we can begin a new year with a clean slate.

The believer has more than just a clean slate, wiped clean of past sins by the blood of Christ. He also has the living Christ in his heart by faith to give Him hope, love, courage, discernment, victory over the bondage to sin and all one needs to face the future. "The future is as bright as the promises of God" is a well-known saying that is true even now as we enter the new year.

Will you face the new year burdened by fears, worries, guilt, failures, all the result of sin? Or will you face the new year with faith, courage, hope and peace because you have brought your sins to the cross and left them there and will allow the risen Christ to give these blessings to your heart and life?

"The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved." Don't enter the new year without having made your peace with God.

Lessons in Proverbs

Often in life we seek to develop plans to suit our style of living. Sometimes the thought may be very excellent. Even though our thoughts may be correct, we need to make sure our plans are inside the will of God. It is vital, then, to let God guide our minds. Solomon indicates in Proverbs 16:1-9 how important it is for a person to let God shape his concerns.

What type of thoughts shape your mind? Do you do a lot of thinking about your work, your school work, your last year's profit, or maybe about the bad weather that came unexpectedly? Proverbs 16:1 says: "The plans of the heart belong to man. But the answer of the tongue is from the Lord." We may often have dreams and certain expectations we would like to reach; yet everything that we receive is from the Lord.

Solomon writes about how all the ways of a man are spotless in his own sight. On the outside we can feel happy and even make others think that everything is going just fine. But inside we are really hurting. We may want someone to take special notice of us and show us that they care. We can make special plans for next year but yet have the wrong motivation. It is really great when we do things and after we have finished we can say that it was done "for the Lord's sake."

In verse 3, Solomon speaks of commitment. Each person, if he has not done so before, needs to commit his way, or, in other words, his life, unto the Lord. Jesus will accept us only if we ask Him to and ask Him to forgive our sins and to come into our lives. Once we have a commitment to God, then the Lord will establish our plans. Each day for the committed believer can be the continuing of the salvation God has given

to him.

Many people are concerned about their lives. God is also concerned about our lives. As we encounter trials and new experiences, God will provide the grace to live with particular difficult situations. Even though we might prefer to run away from what God has placed in our way, His way is always the best.

The author, Solomon, in verses 4 and 5, tells how God rejects the proud. In the sight of God, pride is never acceptable. Even a small amount of pride is never accepted in God's sight. Only the strength which God supplies is strength at all.

Our Father in heaven has not left anybody without a purpose. As the clock strikes 12:00 midnight, the wicked come closer to "the day of evil." The warning is clear to all who will read the Scriptures or listen to someone who is a Christian and who shares with them. The person whose life goes out in all directions, but avoids God, will never be acceptable to the Lord.

Pride should be avoided by the Christian. Pride can hold a person back from serving God. Pride can make a person who is serving God so proud of what he is doing that God is left out of the picture. Pride for the non-Christian can hold him back from a living relationship with Jesus Christ. Satan often keeps a non-Christian from seeing that he has a real need for having his sins forgiven. If one has no need of this then one won't see his need of the Savior.

God does more than simply dislike the proud. Solomon tells how each person who is proud is an abomination to the Lord. This means that God intensely hates the sin of pride. The Lord will also punish the proud. In our day of so little proper discipline and love one can see why God is looked upon by many people as a mild mannered person who accepts anybody. This is not true. God will only

accept those who have entrusted their lives into Christ's hands.

Verse 6 gives us an answer as to how sins can be cleansed. The Christian should be seen as a person who stands for truth. Unfavorable news about someone is passed on not to just the people with whom we have regular contact, but often to many other people as well. If a person does something that others dislike, it is interesting how many other people hear about it. Our sins can not be atoned for by anything we do, but only by what God has done for us in Jesus Christ. Christ is the only one who can make us truthful.

Many times people will say that sincerity is enough in order to be accepted by God. It isn't, though. What would happen to a person who believed that a bridge was ahead of him on the road, but in fact it had been washed out by a storm? He is sincere but he still wouldn't make it across the river.

In verses 6 to 9, the Lord gives direction to our ways and our plans. Man is not put down as a nobody in these verses. Instead, man's ways are seen as under the authority of God's ways.

In families and among friends there may be feelings of hostility that turn into fighting. There may be bad feelings even about people we don't know. If another person is passing our car on the highway and he makes us apply our brakes rather suddenly, what is our reaction? Have we suddenly developed a hostile attitude with judgmental feelings toward that person? Or do we trust God about the situation and thank Him from the bottom of our hearts for the experience, that we might learn patience? If we do give thanks, God can use our attitude to His glory in the next situation we face instead of our carrying over a hostility complex.

Verse 7 states: "When a man's ways are pleasing to the Lord, He makes even his enemies to be at peace

with him." It really doesn't accomplish much when we pick a fight with someone who won't fight back. I think this is what Solomon is trying to convey in this verse. When our lives are controlled by the Holy Spirit, even those who don't like us have to hunt to find something to oppose us on.

We see in so many places, on the street, in government, in homes, in business, the individual lives, that righteousness in needed. So often what people do is molded by their thinking. This thinking often is not godly in character. How important it is that there is righteousness in the heart.

Wealth does not bring all the answers to people's lives. Greed can be found in people, from the very poorest person to the one with the most money. Our minds should not be bottled up with so much thinking of material possessions that we don't put God in first place in our lives.

Verse 9 states: "The mind of man plans his ways, but the Lord directs his steps." When one embraces Christianity, it doesn't mean that we receive a free ticket to be lazy the rest of our lives. Man still has to use his mind and he still has a free will after trusting in Christ. Man can do a lot of thinking and yet God gives the direction. The man within Christianity never is free from the guidance of the Lord. Instead he should seek continual guidance and direction from God. As we come into the year 1975, we have many options. There are many forces at work in this world. There are many false ideas plaguing the streets of the smallest towns and the largest cities. Often many people don't make any choice. No choice for God is really a choice against Him. The Lord is willing to receive you if you are willing to call upon Him. Isaiah expresses what your heart needs, if you are not really sure of your peace with God. And God promises to answer, for the Lord accepts all who earnestly seek Him.

Isaiah 55:6, 7: "Seek ye the Lord while He may be found, call ye upon Him while He is near: let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him: and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon."

We welcome Pastor Battleson as our new writer and look forward to his first article in our next issue of the Ambassador.


YEAR OF OPPORTUNITY

"Only one life, 'twill soon be past; only what's done for Christ will last."

I think it would be well for each one of us to take a moment to ask ourselves, "What am I doing for Christ?" By my deeds and prayers, am I among those who are witnessing for Christ? Am I using my time and talents for the building of God's kingdom? Our days on this earth are numbered, yet we are often so busy providing for our material welfare that we forget that our lives may be snapped up in the twinkle of an eye. Only God knows how long our days of opportunity will last. He wants us to remember that each day brings us closer to the home which Christ is preparing for us. Are we preparing to meet Him?

The parable is told of the rich man who had bountiful harvests and decided to build larger barns to hold his supply; thus he planned to have goods laid up for many years so that he could take his ease, eat, drink, and be merry. But God said to him, "Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee." Jesus concluded the parable by saying, "So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God." What an example of the world today. People are so busy spending their time and efforts in striving for these earthly pleasures and possessions, that little time

and attention is given in laying up spiritual treasures.

Let us examine ourselves in relation to our home life. The dawn of each day ought to be a checking-out post for the Christian. Do we as a family gather around for devotions and in faith seek God's guidance for the day? Even the smaller children become sharers in the devotions of their elders. They quickly become familiar with the holy and reverent thoughts expressed in the beautiful language associated with Bible reading and with worship. It is good that children can grow up in a home with these Christian practices. These things will prove to be a source of strength in their later years. The opportunity for Christian mothers and fathers to introduce their children to the Master is the most important event in the parent-child relationship. In a Christian home there is much treasure, there is love, understanding, forgiveness, kindness and peace.

Love spoken, read and understood everywhere identifies the Christian. Love is an ever open door of communication. Do we have a deep concern and love for all those about us? Love is not expressed in words alone, it is also communicated through attitudes and actions, such as a cheerful smile for someone or a warm hand-clasp or a helpful deed for someone who may be in need.

A forgiving spirit is also needful. Perhaps it does more for the one who

forgives than for the one who is forgiven, but in either case it restores a wholesome relationship between both. Hatred closes the door through which God's love comes to us. Forgiveness is necessary. "If ye do forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses."

These things speak clearly of the love God has implanted in each Christian's heart. Redeem the time for the days are evil. Time is a gift of God. We are stewards of time. We must take time for those things which are needful if we expect to receive the crown of life which the Lord has promised to them that love Him. So let us use our time in preparing ourselves and others for heaven where we may live in that beautiful mansion that Christ has prepared for His own. Are you redeeming the time?
