MEDITATION MOMENTS

THE TRIAL OF ALONENESS

"He said, 'I have been very jealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the people of Israel have forsaken Thy covenant, thrown down Thy altars, and slain Thy prophets with the sword; and I, even I only, am left; and they seek my life, to take it away" (I Kings 19:10).

Those are the words of Elijah, a man tested in the crucible of aloneness as few men have been. Perhaps only Jeremiah of the Old Testament felt as forsaken of human comfort.

As a prophet he was God's mouthpiece to a nation which chose rather to listen to sweet-talking false prophets who predicted good things when calamity was at the door.

In Scripture it is Elijah who stands out as the representative of the prophets, for it was he and Moses (the Law) who appeared with Jesus on the Mount of Transfiguration. Also, when Jesus asked His disciples what people were saying about Him, they reported that some thought He was Elijah come back to earth.

Particularly, we remember Elijah's contest with the prophets of Baal and Asherah on Mount Carmel. Talk about aloneness! There were 850 of them against the lone man of God. We know the story well. All morning and into

the afternoon the heathen prophets cajoled their gods to consume their sacrifice. Elijah, confident in his God, pestered them with taunts.

Then his turn came and he called upon the Lord God to send fire to burn his water-drenched sacrifice. And it came from heaven to devour not only the sacrifice but the altar itself. Elijah's faith was mightily vindicated.

That wasn't the end of Elijah's testing by aloneness. Queen Jezebel, infuriated at the loss of the priests, vowed his death. In fear he fled to a cave and there he cried out the words of our text. But God told him that He still had work for him to do and that there were yet 7,000 who were keeping the faith. Elijah wasn't alone.

Spiritually speaking, there is a general sense of aloneness today. God's people are a minority in the world, a rather small minority. The world's population is growing faster than evangelization is taking place. A man once asked Jesus, "Are there few that be saved?" Jesus didn't give him any numbers, but only asked him to be sure of his own relationship to Him. God will always have His 7,000. Be sure to be among them.

Then there is the personal aloneness one may experience. One may be the

only Christian in a home, in a small high school, in a college class or dormitory, in a military barracks, in a shop, in a construction outfit, in a rest home. There are people around, there are associations, perhaps even some pleasantries, but there is no fellowship at the deepest level, that of the soul. And there may be some persecution.

It is easy to become discouraged. A most prized tool of the devil is discouragement. But the answer to aloneness comes from men like Elijah and Jeremiah. They had their personal fellowship with the Lord. This sustained them. It was worth more than all else. The word to Christians is this: stay in the Word, give yourself to God's work, be much in prayer. And then I pray that God will give you Christian fellowship to help build you up in the most holy faith.

Remember, it is possible to escape aloneness by walking life's broad way, but that will lead to the final, ultimate aloneness, separation from God in hell for eternity. On the other hand, Christ's way here may at times lack Christian companionship, but it leads to the eternal fellowship with Christ and all the saints.


and overall ministry. Annually they give direction to the Association.

RULES FOR WORK CHANGE

That litera 10a, which presently reads: "No member can serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms" be changed to read: "No board member can serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms."

The above amendment will require a 2/3 majority at the 1975 Annual Conference to become effective. The change is proposed in order to make clear that corporation memberships are not bound to the two consecutive terms restriction which applies to board memberships.



When I behold Thee, Thou patient



A REPORT ON THE BIBLE SCHOOL CHOIR TOURS

From Kirkland, we went to Astoria, Ore., then to Eugene. This was our half-way mark of the tour. Eight concerts had been sung of our scheduled 16.

On April 8th the Choir sang at Ferndale, Wash. While travelling to Morton, Wash., the next day, we stopped in Seattle to sing a condensed concert at the Lutheran Bible Institute there.

At 6:00 a.m., April 9, we left Morton for Kalispell where a second program was given. Next we sang at North American Free Church in Great Falls, Mont. From there we went to Culbertson (one place we didn't stay overnight) and then to Tioga, N. Dak., after the concert. At Tioga the Choir sang for Sunday morning worship, which was broadcast over the radio. Sunday evening a performance was given at Minnewaukan, N. Dak.

The Choir sang its closing concert at Upsala, Minn., on Monday night. This brought an end to the main 1975 tour. Our director, Don Rodvold; pianist, Orpha Flaten; and dean, Richard Snipstead, along with the Choir members, agree that it was a success and all experiences and blessings received will long be remembered.

May 1-4 the Choir toured northern Minnesota and eastern North Dakota. The Choir gave concerts at Bagley, Minn., and McVille and Grafton, N. Dak. Sunday morning we travelled to Greenbush, Minn., to sing and then on to Roseau, Minn., for an afternoon concert. Blessings were received by both listeners and Choir members.

Physicals can usually be used for more than one purpose. If you are attending another camp, or involved in the sports program of your school you can combine and use one form. Ask for additional forms, if you wish. Make certain they are dated. Parishes or districts may be able to organize a day for physicals, thereby reducing the cost.

BUSINESS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The elections which will take place at next week's Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations have already been mentioned. They are important, they are crucial. The president, vice-president and secretary of the Church are to be chosen. Expired terms on various boards and committees are to be filled. Corporation memberships must be updated. There are committees to be selected for the 1976 conference.

It will be the privilege of the Conference to ordain six men into the Christian ministry. Five are graduates of our Seminary, the other, Missionary George Knapp, lacks credits, but because of his extensive experience in mission work and his seminary studies, and the fact that he has to return to the field this year, his ordination has been requested now by the Board of World Missions. Two other graduates of the Seminary this year have petitioned to have their ordinations in their home congregations and that will be so done at later dates.

Another conference highlight will be the dedication of the men's dormitory of the Bible School. That event will take place on Sunday morning. The dedication address will be delivered by a man who has been so closely connected with most of the history of the school, Pastor R. Snipstead. The construction of the dormitory completes the hard core needs of the school. Further building may come at a later date (chapel, administration building), but the school can operate comfortably with what it now has. The dedication ceremony will be impressive and, together with the ordination service in the afternoon, will bring one of the largest crowds ever to assemble at the headquarters and campus.

The Annual Conference will be introduced to the evangelist-youth worker who has now been chosen for the Church. He is Rev. David C. Molstre, Thief River Falls, Minnesota. His acceptance of call by the Commission on Evangelism, Coordinating Committee and Youth Board has been previously reported. The decision to call was made at the last annual conference and this year's meeting will be able to rejoice in the position filled.

There was some discussion last year about securing a director of home mission work in the Church. Perhaps that will come up again, although it is difficult to see how the AFLC could call still another man out of the parish ministry now for administrative work.

Another conference decision of last year has received little or no publicity during the year. It is one which resolved "that a qualified lay person be sought out by the Co-ordinating Committee as a full-time worker in the area of stewardship." There had been some objection that an evangelist should be secured before a stewardship counsellor. Now that position has been filled and the Co-ordinating Committee can move ahead on this matter, if it has been holding back on that account. At any rate, the Committee will advise the Conference on what has been done. Personally, we feel that the conference resolution should be expedited during the next year.

Home Missions will report considerable activity during the past year and the intention to support strongly two new fields in 1975-76. One has called a full-time pastor and the other will be served by a student this summer. Other promising areas are available to us, but the Church is hampered by a lack of pastors in entering them. The Church Extension Fund stands to experience good growth as the Schools have closed their loan program and are encouraging lenders to turn to the CEF instead. It is a fund which can accept all loans because the need is so great and what is loaned to it is in turn loaned to others. It is perpetual money.

In outreach in Brazil, no dramatic new steps are expected at the Conference. But don't be surprised to hear a strong plea made for a new missionary couple in the next year or so. While Miss Priscilla Wold was added to the mission force as a single worker during the twelvemonth, so new mission couple has been sent out since the Connely Dyruds in 1969. The contention will likely be made that not much more new can be done in Brazil unless the mission staff is enlarged.

As to Schools, with the men's dormitory a reality, the work at the Bible School can be concentrated on the day-by-day teaching of the Scriptures and related subjects. There will be a call for more young men and women to come to study at AFLBS, to thus make use of the fine accommodations now available for both men and women. The Conference will be told, in all likelihood, that no dean of the Bible School will be chosen immediately, but during the ensuing year, and that in the meantime the duties which Pastor Snipstead has carried will be shared by several men. One or two new full-time staff may be enlisted to take up work at AFLBS this summer.

The Seminary is in need of more students, an annual situation. The number of men going into parish work from the Seminary next year will be less than this year. The continuing prayer of the Church must be for more men for the ministry. May the need lie heavy upon our hearts.

A minor revision to the Rules for Work is to be acted upon at this year's conference. It pertains to litera 10a, which presently reads, "No member can serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms." Paragraph 10 refers to corporation members as well as board members. It was the sense of the conference last year that the limitation to two consecutive terms was never intended to apply to corporation membership, only board membership. Hence, an amendment to change litera 10a was offered, reading thus: "No board member can serve for more than two (2) consecutive terms." We support this amendment and trust that the Conference will support it when it is acted upon.

Other business will be transacted in Minneapolis, June 11-15, and reports will be heard concerning general administration, stewardship, publications and parish education, pensions, youth work and other areas.

Prospects are for one of the largest turnouts for a conference in the history of the Association. Many will want to see the new dormitory and beautified grounds, some for the first time.

Again, we urge much prayer on behalf of the Annual Conference. Pray that the Spirit of God may be permitted to do His good work among us in unifying, purifying, motivating, enabling and directing the AFLC in the Kingdom work in which she has been permitted to share.

NEW INTEREST RATES ON LOANS

The Association of Free Lutheran Congregations is deeply grateful to its constituency for the wonderful response in loans received primarily into the Praise Fund to meet the cost of the Men's Dormitory building. To encourage people to make loans, the interest rate was set at 8% on loans of \$1,000.00 or more for a period of five years. This rate was the same for both the Schools Loan program and the Church Extension Fund. Due to decreasing returns on AFLC investments, the Schools' Board of Trustees and the Home Mission Board have decided to set the interest rate at 7% on all future loans in the amount of \$1000 or more and for a period of five years, and 6% on loans of less than \$1000 or for less than five years. This new rate will be effective as of June 1, 1975.
