Meditation Moments

Lent and the Cross in Your Life

"Follow Me"

Luke 9:23: "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

Self-denial, cross-bearing and Christ-following are our themes for this Lenten season. This, the last in the series, challenges us to service for Christ, to persevere in testings, have victory over sin and to experience the realization of the promise.

Following Jesus is a very noble expression and has been manifested in unbelievable ways. The one point on the pendulum would have to be the cloistered monk who lived in terrible circumstances of depravation. The other extreme would be the total involvement economically, socially and politically to the point of revolutionary tactics, such as Camil Torrez in Colombia. In between is a whole world of interpretations each equally promoted as the truth. In an effort to not digress from the premise, the words of Jesus "follow me," I would propose to show through the life of Christ and His teachings how he explained this statement.

First, the following as I previously mentioned, is premised upon the fact that Christ rules in our lives and the ego is set aside. Also, on the gracious divine power that works through our inadequacies as we take up our cross. Then the following is conditioned by His will and power as He works in and through us.

Secondly, following means to have a vision. Jesus was not alone on the Mount of Transfiguration, He had His desciples with him. The truth of His messianic Sonship and divinity plunged even deeper into their whole being as they saw and heard what took place.

Thirdly, the disciples as His followers experienced the heat of embarrasment as the Messiah was rejected by the Samaritan village for His Jewishness. That, as we know, was only one of the many times such a reaction took place. The ultimate rejection was at Calvary.

Fourthly, His followers experienced the frightening loss among themselves of members. The press of family and business was far too great as was the struggle of doubt caused by the psychology of numbers as more and more individuals left this Way. Following Jesus was no longer "in."

Fifthly, the Savior did many works that excited the multitudes and were, to His followers, unbelievable blessings. A crippled woman walked again. The man with swollen arms and legs was healed. Healthy bodies were restored to lepers. A blind beggar went away from Jesus beholding a world that previously was only understood by touch, sound and smell. A sense of reassurance because the world was a bit better off because of this ministry of healing.

Sixthly, the Savior taught his disciples in an informal, fluid setting, helping them to utilize what they learned. There were no blackboards, chairs, closed circuit TV, textbooks, or time schedules. Yet the disciples were knowledgeable men of the Scrip-

tures. They had their laboratory testouts as they witnessed and partook of the feedings of the thousands. They applied their knowledge as they went out, casting out demons, healing bodies, convincing people that Jesus was the Messiah. This was their internship. When it was time, they returned and evaluated their experiences. Following was a time of discovery and utilization of the new.

In the seventh place, to follow Jesus is to have fellowship. The scene at Martha's and Mary's house... friends with whom there was rapport. The Last Supper and final words of instruction and encouragement. Just two instances that stand out for me as principles to carry into my life as one among a multitude of this great fellowship. How we can pray together, eat together, help one another, weep together and many other like things.

And lastly, they struggled, were tempted, and ran away. Yet, there was a way back and it was brought about by the One whom they followed. They remembered the instructions of Jesus. While they had followed from a distance when Jesus went to Calvary, they knew in their hearts that they had been untrue, they had abandoned Him. Eleven of the disciples returned through repentance and faith. Each one of us knows from how far off, from what distance we are following Christ. Of what effect is our service to him? Is there perserverance in testings? Is there victory over sin? Would you save your life? Then, follow Him!

The Victorious Victim

Isaiah 53:1-6

During this Lenten Season we again take special notice of the suffering of our Lord. His suffering was an integral part of our redemption. As we examine the Gospel narratives, we realize that Christ's greatest suffering was not the physical mistreatment He endured. It was rather the inner turmoil caused by His knowledge of the Father's will, coupled with Satan's attempts to divert Him. The Passion of Christ and His temptation are intimately connected.

The Tempted Messiah

In our text we are given a picture of the tempted Messiah. Isaiah gives us the most intimate glimpse of Christ's mission among men. He writes with the vividness and accuracy of an eyewitness. His description of the Lord's work plainly indicates that there would be temptation. As the Messiah, promised often by God and publicly proclaimed by the prophets, the Christ was to redeem His people from sin. One of the steps involved in His ultimate victory over the devil, the world, and the flesh was His temptation. An untempted man would have no right to lay hold of the claim of sinlessness. The Savior would. of necessity, have to be "made like His brethren in all things, that He might become a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God" (Hebrews 2:17).

When we think of the temptation of Jesus, our thoughts usually go to the experience of Christ during His wilderness fast. The variety of our Lord's temptations has been obscured by the attention that is concentrated upon this one episode known as the temptation in the wilderness. Yet it must be included because of its prominence.

Luke states that the temptations by Satan were carried on for forty days, after which time the three commonly known temptations occurred. Each temptation begins with a questioning of God's Word. Some forty days earlier, Jesus had heard the voice from heaven declaring Him to be the Son of God; now He was hearing the voice of one doubting and tempting Him to doubt-"If you are the Son of God"-"If you will worship me"-"If you are the Son of God." Satan's tactics were the same here as they had been when he tempted Adam and Eve. He will use logic or emotion; if only he can get man to doubt what God has said. He knows what God has said, but will distort it to accomplish his own end. Today he tempts, "If God is love, He won't punish sin too severely," or, "If you are a Christian, God will forgive you if you do this just once." Satan is an unbeliever and will take God's Word for nothing. He denies the Word of God and all who deny that Word today are his followers.

To think that this temptation in the wilderness was the culmination of Satan's efforts to stop the ministry of Jesus is a mistake. After Jesus successfully thwarted the purpose of Satan, the tempter "departed from Him until an opportune time" (Luke 4:13). Satan was not done yet. His kingdom and power were in danger. Christ was come to undo the condemnation which had resulted from Satan's successful assault on the first Adam. Satan well knew the power of Christ and sought by every means possible to turn Him from the purpose for which He had come.

Other Temptations

The temptations Jesus encountered were not all as obvious as those He faced in the wilderness. Subtle suggestions to swerve Him from His mission were presented by friend and foe

alike. The Savior's own family and brethren were a source of trial as we see from the incident at the wedding at Cana (John 2:4) and the request of His brethren that He go to Judea to perform miracles (John 7:3-6). Even Peter, His dedicated disciple, was used by Satan to suggest that He escape death at the hands of the chief priests, scribes, and elders.

It is likely that the greatest temptations Jesus encountered were in the days immediately preceding His death. From the time He left Galilee and "resolutely set His face to go to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51), we can be sure that the temptation to depart from the Father's plan was very strong. On this eighty-mile journey Jesus had many opportunities to turn from His path which led to the cross. While in Bethany enjoying warm fellowship in the home of His intimate friends, Martha, Mary, and Lazarus, Jesus surely was tempted to remain there where He was dearly loved rather than go to Jerusalem where He knew He would be rejected and crucified. We are all acquainted with the trials in Gethsemane and later on the cross where, with victory within His grasp. He was again challenged to save Himself. None of us can fully comprehend the intensity of Satan's attack against Jesus.

He Was Victorious

Thank God for His victory over temptations! Christ withstood them. He conquered. His obedience has great significance for our own spiritual life. "We are more than conquerors through Him that loved us" (Romans 8:37, KJV). As Jesus withstood the onslaughts of Satan, so we, through Him, shall conquer. Our High Priest can sympathize with our weakness since He "has been tempted in all things as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15). Tempted as we arehow are we tempted? In the final anal-

ysis, the trial and temptation which hounded our Lord was the temptation TO SEEK AN EASIER WAY THAN THAT OF DOING THE WILL OF THE FATHER. But Christ's life was dominated by the desire to do the will of the Father. Everything that tended to swerve the Savior from that purpose was a temptation.

We, too, are tempted to swerve from God's purpose for our lives. What is His purpose for us? We are not products of chance set adrift in this world without a goal. God "desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:4). Since the fall, man has been trying to accomplish salvation from sin and guilt and has sought a knowledge of truth. But his godless efforts are usually attempts to accomplish the will of the Father via more comfortable channels (i.e., salvation through works or social reform, knowledge of the truth through education). It is difficult for man to accept God's terms, that is, to deny self and admit a dependence on God for salvation. Thus man succumbs to the temptation that Christ conquered—seeking an easier way than that of doing the will of the Father.

Dangers to Spiritual Life

What things in the world endanger and threaten to destroy spiritual life? In 1 John 2:16 we find the three basic categories into which all temptations of the world fall: the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, the boastful pride of life. Let us compare these words with the recorded accounts of the first Adam's fall and the last Adam's victory. Genesis 3:6 says, "the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eves, and that the tree was desirable to make one wise." These three temptations were the cause of Adam and Eve's undoing and through the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners" (Romans 5:19). Christ's threefold temptation in the wilderness also involved the three areas to which Adam had been subjected. The parallel is obvious. But, because of the obedience of Christ, many will be made righteous.

"All we like sheep have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own

way; but the Lord has caused the iniquity of us all to fall on Him." The sinner's sins are placed on the Lamb of God. He who was obedient brings God's favor upon those who were disobedient. There is no promise in Scripture that the children of God will escape temptation. Rather, we are reminded to "consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials; knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance" (James 1:2, 3). The enemies that harass our faith and overcame Adam have been defeated by Christ. He was obedient. His promise should encourage us. "In the world you have tribulation, but take courage; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Rejoice in the victory that is ours through Christ. Though Satan is still active in tempting and deceiving through the world and our flesh, there has come One Who has broken his strangle hold on mankind. Remember the One Who endured the same temptations you face, look for the way of escape God has promised, and thank God for the victory that is yours through Jesus Christ our Lord.

CHARTER PLANE TRIP TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE BEING STUDIED

The Co-ordinating Committee has asked Mrs. James C. Eletson of Duluth to check into the possibility of arranging a charter plane flight to the Annual conference in Ferndale, Washington.

We can arrange for a 100-passenger DC-9. leaving Minneapolis on Monday, June 11, and returning to Minneapolis on Monday, June 18. There would be a stop in Fargo for passengers to board and embark, and the destination for the flight will be Bellingham, Wash, about ten miles from Ferndale. All of these plans are tentative and the quotation for round-trip per person is \$135.00. The regular plane rates for this trip would be between \$216 and \$260 per person. Bus rates for the round trip from Minneapolis to Vancouver are \$92.15, requiring three days, at least, of travel, plus all the expense of meals and lodging, if you stop over along the way.

Of course, arrangements will have to be made for the possible parking of cars at headquarters and transportation to the airport in Minneapolis, as well as travel plans from Bellingham to Ferndale. These are all being checked out, but we did want to publicize the fact that a charter flight is being worked on, and to request all those who may be even slightly interested in this method of transportation to the Annual Conference to get in touch with Mrs. Eletson at 2130 East Superior Street, Duluth, Minnesota 55812, immediately.

THE

MYSTERY OF

GODLINESS

"These things write I unto thee, hoping to come unto thee shortly: But if I tarry long, that thou mayest know how to behave thyself in the house of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of the truth.

And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory" (1 Tim. 3:14-16).

Let us first notice briefly what the true church is, and what her business is here in the world.

1. She is the house of God.

A place where God dwells and works. The house of God does not necessarily mean the church building. You cannot box God into a wooden or stone structure. But as Peter says: Ye are living stones built up as a spiritual house (1 Pet. 2:5). God dwells with His people. And Paul is telling Timothy, and you and me how to conduct ourselves properly in the house of God.

2. She is the church of the living God.

God is not dead, He is very much alive, so is His true church.

The next two names tell us what her business is: She is the pillar, the ground or foundation of the truth. Just as sure as the pillar and the foundation hold up the building, so does the true church hold up the truth.

The devil and his gang are working overtime to hold down the truth in unrighteousness (Rom 1:18). The wrath of God is upon them that hold down the truth, whether they meet in a chapel, church or cathedral; but the blessing of God is upon all those who are lifting up and holding forth the truth. There is a terrific competition between these two camps.

What truth is the church of Jesus Christ especially called to proclaim?

The mystery of godliness.

What is the mystery of godliness? CHRIST.

In the last verse here we find six things concerning Christ which make up the mystery of godliness.

1. Christ is God manifest in the flesh

He is the eternal Word clothed in our flesh and blood, Jn. 1:1,14. God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself, II Cor. 5:19. This is the "good news," the glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ.

2. He was justified in the Spirit.

He was made to be sin for us in the flesh, delivered up to death for our offences; but being raised again, He was justified in the Spirit. He was declared to be the Son of God with power, by the resurrection from the dead, Rom 1:4. By the resurrection, He proved that He was just what he claimed to be.

3. He was seen of angels.

The angels worshipped Him. They attended His incarnation, proclaimed that He was born, Lk. 2:10-11. They came and ministered to Him when He had been tempted by the devil in the wilderness, Matt 4:11. When He was agonizing and sweating blood in the garden of Gethsemane an angel came

and strengthened Him, Lk 22:43. On Easter morning an angel came and rolled away the stone and said: "He is not here for He is risen" (Matt. 28:2-6). As Jesus ascended into heaven, two angels came and said to His disciples: This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11). Indeed, He was seen and served by angels.

4. He is preached unto the Gentiles.

This is a great part of the mystery of godliness. The good news was first preached to the Jews, but now through the death of Christ, the middle wall of partition was broken down and Christ was proclaimed Savior and Redeemer to all the people also the Gentiles.

5. He was believed on in the world.

There is power in the preaching of Christ. It produces faith. "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." He is believed on in the world; out of every kindred, and tongue, and people, and nation there are believers in Christ.

6. He was received up in glory.

This is the last stop.

He came from heaven's glory clear down to the death of the cross to take away our sins, and He took them all away by the sacrifice of Himself. God let the enmity of man crucify His own Son and thereby slayed the enmity and reconciled the world unto himself, Eph. 2:16.

What mystery of godliness,

He died for the ungodly, for sinners, for the weak and helpless, for people with a nature full of hatred to God, Rom. 5:6-10. So now you can come as ungodly as you are, as sinful as you are, as weak and helpless as you are and be saved and justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus.

This is a mystery of godliness only revealed to and experienced by repentant and believing sinners. How He could leave heaven's glory and come down clear to the death of the cross to save a sinner like me, I cannot understand. But I believe it, and I rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory, and the best comes last—I will be received up into glory.

Where are you going when you get to your last stop?



ROSEAU CHURCH BURNED MORTGAGE

Roseau Lutheran Church of Roseau, Minnesota, burned their mortgage during a special service on Sunday, January 21. Representing the Association of Free Lutheran Congregation and its Home Mission Board was the Rev. Herbert Franz of Cloquet, Minnesota, who also brought the message. Also taking part in the service were the first trustees, Francis Drown, Ed Olson and Art Welin, as well as the prsent trustees. Leonard Kveen. Nels Johnson and Art Welin, along with the pastor, the Rev. Jerome Nikunen. Special music was provided by Mrs. Clifford Elgin and the Junior Choir. A dinner served by the Gleaners followed the service.

Members of the congregation began meeting on February 22, 1966, and officially organized as a congregation on May 25, 1966, using the former Seventh Day Adventist Church as a place of worship. They purchased the former Emmanuel German Lutheran Church and moved it to its present

location at the corner of 9th Avenue and 2nd Street N.E. and extensive remodeling was begun. First services were held in the church on August 28, 1966, and the church and parsonage were dedicated on September 24, 1967. On October 29, 1966, the congregation voted to affiliate with the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations and is presently aligned with Rose, Spruce and Norland to form the Roseau Free Lutheran Parish.

Those who have served as pastors are Student Pastor Larry Severson, June, 1966, to June, 1967; Rev. Edwin Kjos, June, 1967, to June, 1970; Student Pastor Michael Brandt, June, 1970, to April 1971; and the present pastor, Rev. Jerome Nikunen, who began serving in April, 1971.

NEW CONGREGATION AT GREENBUSH BUILDING CHURCH

On February 21, United Lutheran Church of Greenbush, Minn., Gene Sundby, Lay Pastor, voted by nearly 95 percent to launch a \$102,550 building program. This will include a nave or sanctuary for worship, a fellowship hall and also nine classrooms and a pastor's study. The nave will seat 200 and with an overflow capacity in the parish hall can accommodate around 450 people in all.

Construction will be of brick and will begin in mid-May or at the first of June. Completion is set for Thanksgiving if delays are not caused by material shortages. United Lutheran Congregation just completed a parsonage, too, last September, at the approximate cost of \$25,000.

United Lutheran is a merger of Bethania, Pauli and Zion congregations, with additions from Bethlehem Lutheran Church.

We are encouraged by the unity of spirit and the interest shown in the work

But please, let's not judge the Biblical, genuine, beautiful work of the Holy Spirit through the Pentecostal Movement by the situations where man has stepped in under Satan's influence and has discolored the genuine Gifts of the Holy Spirit. Judge the work of Satan, but we must pray for the gift of discernment so that we would not belittle the genuine Gifts. All His Gifts are worthwhile and wonderful-the Lord does not give anything that isn't. Praise His Name,

WE CALL OURSELVES A "FELLOWSHIP"

At the time that the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations was begun in late October, 1962, and in the months that followed, we deliberately often used the word "Fellowship" to describe ourselves. This was done, at least in part, as a reaction against anything that would smack of control over congregations from above, in an organized church structure. The AFLC congregations were free to run their own affairs and their associating together was not to be carried out in the sense usually associated with the word "synod." (Although that word, too, is sometimes used among us as simply a synonym for church body.)

Therefore, the word fellowship has served us well. It connotes people of like mind and spirit living, working and meeting together.

Someone raised a point about this word "fellowship" the other day, though. He suggested that our frequent use of it in relationship to the AFLC may be a barrier to the expansion of our group. He reasoned thus: "fellowship" may give the picture of a group which so enjoys the company of those who make it up that it fails to reach out in evangelism to others or is hindered in the outreach it attempts to make.

We hadn't thought of it that way. Nor are we sure this is a valid argument. What do our readers think?

It is true that individual congregations have had this happen to them, whether they were using the word fellowship to describe themselves or not. They have become tightly-knit groups, perhaps quite small, the members of which enjoyed their own company and intentionally or unintentionally excluded others from coming in. There is little interest in growth and expansion.

Getting back to the AFLC, let's keep using the word fellowship as a noun to describe our association together. It is a good word. But let's also examine to see whether we use this precious togetherness that the Lord has given us as a comfortable pillow which lulls us into carelessness or lack of concern. Shame on us if others get the impression that we don't want to evangelize and that ours isn't a fellowship open to all.

We aren't speaking about lowering confessional standards or other beliefs about life and practise. But we do mean that others must sense that we care about them and that other things being equal they are welcome to "fellowship" with us.

LARGE ATTENDANCE MARKS AFLC'S WINTER CONFERENCE IN FARGO

The recently concluded Winter Bible Conference at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Fargo, N. Dak., was one of the best attended of the 11 held thus far. Dates of the gathering were Feb. 22-25. Melvin Walla was the host lay pastor.

Rev. Harold Hosch, a member of the faculty of the Association Schools, was the Bible study leader. His five presentations were on the timely topic "The Holy Spirit." The first period dealt with the names of the Spirit. In the second and third hours, Rev. Hosch discussed the ministry of the Holy Spirit in the Old Testament. The Spirit's presence and work in the New Testament era was the subject of the final two sessions. Due to popular demand, the five lectures are being prepared in a form available to all interested persons. Announcement of how they may be ordered will be made to Ambassador readers soon.

The conference evening preacher was Rev. Galland of Spicer-Willmar, Minn. On Thursday night he used the theme "Lingering in Sodom," Gen 19: 1-26. He said that delay is one of Satan's most effective traps to put off Christ. The longer we delay the harder it is to leave a life of sin. We live in times when Christians need to take a stand, Pastor Galland declared. The cost is high and the return small if we linger in Sodom. And to look back as Lot's wife did was disastrous. There is a great danger in being nearly saved, he stated.

On Friday night, Pastor Galland took Gal. 3:6, 7 as his text. Abraham believed God and went forth from his own land to one the Lord showed to him. Would we have the same obedience to do as Abraham did? Pastor Galland asked. There is only one true religion, he said, that of Jesus Christ. Satanism is on the increase and we must stand fast on what God has revealed tous.

In his fainl message to the conference, Mr. Galland read Col. 2:20—3:17 as a basis for his meassage and talked about positive aspects of relationship to Christ. Death with Christ, he asserted, is turning our backs on the old life. Following that experi-

ence, the basic Christian principles to be found in Scripture will guide us. The passage he had read contained many such princiles and Pastor Galland elaborated on them. Among them was the exhortation to let the peace of God rule in our hearts.

Rev. Henry A. E. Johansen, Virginia, Minn., delivered the sermon on Sunday morning. Using Isaiah 55:10, 11 as his text, he talked about the written Word, the Bible, and the Living Word, Jesus Christ. The written Word, he stated, doesn't return void as it is sent out, but it saves and judges, as the case may be. The Living Word is a well of living water and it destroys the works of Satan. Pastor Johansen challenged his hearers to be scatterers or sowers of the precious Seed, the Word of God, which is the message of the living Christ.

The closing conference session was on Sunday afternoon and featured musical numbers and testimonies by a Gospel team from the Bible School. Rev. Raynard Huglen, dean of men at AFLBS, brought the message. THE CHURCH AROUND THE WORLD

In 1972 the Southern Baptist Convention became the first U. S. Protestant denomination to boast 12 million members. The year's receipts also experienced a phenomenal rise, easily totalling more than a billion dollars.

British evangelist David Hathaway has been sentenced to a three-year prison term in Prague, Czecho-slovakia, for smuggling Bibles. The government accused him of bringing in seditious literature to incite military revolution.

"We are completely neglecting newer cults that are making converts among our young people by the thousands," says Eternity editor William Petersen. Noting the growth of Zen Buddhism, Hare Krishna, the Children of God, etc., Petersen believes "America has never seen a time when its young people have been so religious and yet so non-Christian." Petersen has authored Those Curious New Cults.

Protests by Christian young people in Denmark were one reason Copenhagen police closed down most of the city's live sex shows.

Indonesia's Christian community is growing at an annual rate of 12-15 percent, perhaps the highest in the world. But of the 7,000,000 Christians, only one in four owns his own Bible. Now the Pocket Testament League, World Home Bible League, and the New York Bible Society International are cooperating to saturate the 2000-mile island chain with Scripture portions.

RARE MALADY CLAIMS LIFE OF PRESIDENT OF THE ALC, DR. KENT KNUTSON, AT 48

Minneapolis (LC) — Dr. Kent Sigvart Knutson, 48-year-old president of the American Lutheran Church, died here on March 12.

Hospitalized for four months and two weeks, Dr. Knutson succumbed to a mysterious malady that taxed the diagnostic skills of the best medical minds at the famed Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

Death came to the young churchman at North Memorial Hospital in Minneapolis, where he had been a patient for seven weeks after 13 weeks of treatment at Mayo. He was moved to North Memorial on January 22 to be closer to his home and family.

Physicians at Mayo attributed Dr. Knutson's fatal illness to Jakob-Creutzfeldt disease, a bizarre disorder of the central nervous system.

Dr. David W. Preus, 50, runner-up to Dr. Knutson and later elected vice-president, is serving as acting president, by action of the Church Council, and will assume the presidency of the ALC. He is a cousin of Dr. J. A. O. Preus, president of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

Kent Sigvart Knutson was born in Goldfield, Iowa, August 7, 1924. He entered Iowa State University at Ames in 1941 but did not graduate until 1947 as he interrupted his studies to spend two years (1944-46) in the U.S. Navy during World War II. An aeronautic electrician's mate, he served in the South Pacific.

After the war, he returned to Iowa State for a year, 1946-47, to complete requirements for a Bachelor of Science degree in chemical engineering, then worked briefly in the process design and research department at Standard Oil of Indiana.

Dr. Knutson enrolled in Luther Seminary in the fall of 1947 and received a Bachelor of Theology degree in 1951. During 1949-50 he interned with the Lutheran Student Foundation of Minnesota. In the summer of 1949 he studied at the University of Oslo in Norway, and in 1950 at the University of Minnesota.

He met Mrs. Knutson, the former Norma Arnesen of Brooklyn, N.Y., at an Ashram, an annual retreat for Lutheran students, in Blue Ridge, N.C. They were married in 1951. A graduate of St. Olaf College at Northfield, Minn., Mrs. Knutson, before her marriage, had served with both the Division of American Missions and the Division of Student Service of the former National Lutheran Council and as dean of women at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, S. Dak. Her father, the late Col. S. J. Arnesen, was publisher of Nordisk Tidende, Norwegian weekly newspaper, for which she was a writer and editor.

For three years after his graduation from Luther, he pursued post-graduate studies at Columbia University and Union Seminary in New York City and at the University of Heidelberg in Germany. He received a Ph.D. from Union in 1961.

Ordained in 1954 by the former Evangelical Lutheran Church, now a part of the ALC, Dr. Knutson served as pastor of Our Saviour Lutheran church in Staten Island, N.Y., from 1954 to 1958.

In 1958, he joined the faculty of Luther Seminary as assistant and later associate professor and then full professor of systematic theology. He was also director of graduate studies from 1960 to 1969 when he was called as president of Wartburg Seminary at Dubuque, Iowa, a post he held until he was elected to the presidency of the ALC in 1970.

Besides his wife, Dr. Knutson leaves six children, Kirsten, 19, Kristofer, 17, Kent, 15, Kaia, 12, Kimberly, 11, and Karl, 8. Kimberly and Karl are natives of Korea who were adopted by the Knutsons several years ago.

He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Gunnar Knutson, of Eagle Grove, Iowa, a sister, Mrs. Charles Kanten of Milan, Minn., and a brother, the Rev. Gerhard Knutson, pastor of St. James Lutheran church in Minneapolis.

A family and congregational service was held at Golden Valley Lutheran Church, Minneapolis, on March 15. A memorial service was

conducted in Dr. Knutson's memory at Central Lutheran Church, Minneapolis, on Sunday, March 18, at 4:00

Burial was at Goldfield, Iowa.

LCMS RECEIVES RECORD PERCENTAGE OF COMMITMENTS 1972 — SETS 1973 BUDGET

St. Louis, Missouri — 1972 Receipts from the 36 Districts of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod totaled 99.5% of commitment, the highest percentage ever. The Board of Directors also announced that a budget of \$27,320,000 has been set for 1973.

Dr. Milton Carpenter, Treasurer of the Missouri Synod, said "It is encouraging to see that each year more and more Districts are meeting their total commitments. In 1972, eleven Districts were able to exceed pledges. We commend these Districts for their extra efforts."

Dr. Carpenter said that in addition seventeen Districts also met their pledges in 1972. Dr. Carpenter added, "The strong support by the Districts certainly contradicts those who say the work of the LCMS is being hampered by controversy. 1972 represents the best financial year ever for the Synod and we thank God for His blessings on His church."

He continued to explain that although this year's budget tops the actual budget for 1972 by over \$28,000, that figure has been more than offset by certain required increases.
