


ABIDING IN CHRIST

John 15

In the Fifteenth Chapter of St. John's Gospel, Jesus is seeking to impress upon us the importance, and absolute necessity, of abiding in Him. In this meditation I do not intend to expound on this chapter as such, but to share with you some thoughts on what it means to abide in Christ. The phrase "in Christ" or its equivalent is found 172 times in the New Testament. The Apostle Paul makes much use of the concept "in Christ" in his writings. It is on this concept that I wish to share with you some thoughts.

E. Stanley Jones, an outstanding missionary and world traveler, still active in missionary work in his 80's, has written a devotional book entitled In Christ. He uses the concept "In Christ" and writes a devotional for every day of the year on what it means to be "in Christ." I will be sharing with you some thoughts and quotations from this book in this meditation.

He said that he wanted to reduce the whole of life to the utmost simplicity. He felt he had found this concept in the phrase "in Christ," and I believe he is right. He says, "If you are 'in Christ' you're 'in life'; if you are 'out of Christ' you're 'out of life.'" If that proposition be true, then it cuts down through all veneer, all seeming, all make-believe, all "halfwayisms," and brings us to the ultimate essence of things. We are either "in Christ" or we are "out of Christ."

Obviously, this concept goes deeper than being interested in religion, for you may be interested in religion and not be "in Christ." You may be interested in church and all of its activities and take an active part and yet not be "in Christ." You may be very interested in orthodoxy and correct teaching and yet not be "in Christ." In fact, you may even have experienced the new birth in the past and yet today you may be out of fellowship with Him and thus not be "in Christ."

Along with E. Stanley Jones, I agree that the phrase "in Christ" is the ultimate phrase in the Christian faith, for it locates us in a Person—the Divine Person—and it locates us in Him here and now. It brings us to the ultimate relationship—"in Christ." Obviously this "in" brings us nearer than "near Christ," or "following Christ," "believing in Christ" or even being "committed to Christ." You cannot go further or deeper than "in."

I can hear someone just now say: "But how can I get to the place that I can be 'in Christ'?" How do I go about it? First, let us take a look at where people are, and then ask yourself, am I like some of these people? Some are "in self" as they are guided by self-interest primarily, which is the driving force of their lives.

To get for self is the compelling motive. Some are "in the herd." Before they act, they look around. They don't act, they only re-act to what the herd does. The roots of such people's motives are in "what will people think?" The Bible teaches that the making of self, or the herd, our god, is sin, the chief sin.

To be "in Christ" means to pull up roots of one's very life from the soil of sin and self and the herd and to plant them "in Christ." He becomes the source of our life, the source of our thinking, our feeling, our acting, our being. This obviously involves selfsurrender. Not merely the surrender of our sins, our bad habits, our wrong thinking, and our wrong motives, but of the very self behind all these. All of these are symptoms, but the unsurrendered self is the disease. So the phrase "in Christ" is not only the ultimate concept, but it demands the ultimate act-self-surrender.

How is it with you, reading these lines? Have you made this self-surrender, this full commitment that Christ asks and demands of you? Are you "in Christ" or are you "out-side of Christ"? Are you "in self," "in the herd," or are you "in Christ"? You, and only you, can answer this question.

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AFLC to Meet in Annual Conference

The Seventh Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations will be held at the Church's Headquarters Building and Schools on the west side of Minneapolis, Minnesota, June 11-15. Also hosting the Conference in Plymouth Village is Medicine Lake Lutheran Church, Richard Snipstead, interim pastor.

In special ceremonies on Sunday afternoon, the new dormitory building on the campus of Association Free Lutheran Bible School will be dedicated. The building was constructed last year and for the present is also used as a classroom facility. The chairman of the Board of Trustees. Rev. E. J. Langness, McVille, N. Dak., will preside at the service. The sermon will be preached by Rev. T. F. Dahle, Spicer, Minn. The Bible School Choir, under the direction of Mr. Donald Rodvold, will sing. Officiating at the dedication will be the Church's president, Rev. John P. Strand.

Four young men will be ordained into the ministry of the Association in a Sunday morning service. A fifth graduate of the Seminary will be ordained in Virginia, Minn. Pastor Strand will deliver the message to the ordinands and conduct the ordination.

The Conference will hear a report from a study committee concerning property ownership and the size of the Co-ordinating Committee. The report has already been published (April 15, 1969) and calls for the retention of the Committee at its present size and for the transfer of some of the Minneapolis property from the Co-ordinating Committee to the Seminary (Schools) Corporation.

There will be elections held for the three constitutional officers this year. Pastor Strand, as president, has completed two three-year terms in office. He is eligible for re-election. Also eligible for re-election are the vice-president and secretary, Rev. R. Snip-

stead and Rev. H. C. Molstre, respectively. However, since they have served three consecutive terms they will need to gain a three-fourths majority of votes cast to continue in office. All nominations for these three positions are from the floor.

Numerous other elections to committees and nominations to corporations will be made by the Conference. It will also send nominations to the Co-ordinating Committee for an editor of **The Lutheran Ambassador** for a three-year term.

All terms of office begin on October 1, unless specified otherwise by individual by-laws.

Rev. Fritjof Monseth, Osseo, Minn., a teacher in the Seminary and the Bible School, will preach the sermon at the opening service on Wednesday night. He will speak on the Conference text, Psalm 145. The theme for the five day conclave is "Great is the Lord."

The Women's Missionary Federation, ladies' auxiliary of the Association, will hold its annual convention on Wednesday, June 11. There will be morning and afternoon sessions. Approximately 200 women will attend these meetings at which time a successor to Mrs. Herbert Presteng, Grafton, N. Dak., as president of the WMF, will be chosen. She has served the two terms allowed by law.

On Thursday night the service at the Conference is a mission festival sponsored by the WMF. Speaker at the event this year will be Missionary John H. Abel, who with his family has recently returned from a term in Brazil, during which time he established the Association's work there, in Parana. Special recognition will also be given to Pastor and Mrs. Connely Dyrud, who with their daughter

will soon leave for Brazil. The Dyruds will be commissioned on June 22 in Thief River Falls, Minn.

Pastor Herbert Franz, Cloquet, Minn., will lead the prayer hours each day at 11:30.

Other speakers will include Mr. Leonard Stulen, Spicer, Minn., at the laymen's service Friday night, and Pastor Kenneth L. Anderson, Radcliffe, Ia., at the Holy Communion service on Sunday morning.

On Saturday night a group of Luther Leaguers will be in charge of the service.

Rev. Laurel Udden, Fergus Falls, Minn., new teacher in the Schools, will speak to the pastors and their wives at their supper on Friday evening.

About 250 pastors and lay delegates are expected to be present for the business sessions of the Annual Conference. Additional guests will be present on Sunday for the ordination and dedication festivities.


HE HAS CONQUERED ALL

PENTECOST IS FOR YOU Acts 2:38-39

"Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call."

From the pen of Saint Luke we have received the full and complete account of that wonderful day of Pentecost. He has it all written down for us in the second chapter of the Book of Acts. It is indeed an exciting and marvelous story. He tells us of strange and mysterious things, things which happened to the disciples on that day so long ago. He tells us of a sound which came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind; of tongues of fire which hovered over the heads of each of the disciples. He tells of the miraclous gift

of tongues which enabled the disciples to speak fluently in many different languages. But Luke also tells of something else, something of far greater importance and it is: "And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit."

This is the real miracle of Pentecost which is evidenced in the lives of those men who were filled with conviction and power. Prior to this time one could see a group of puzzled and uncertain men. They were full of questions. The Lord had told them to win the world in His Name. But they were so few, and the world was so large. Besides this they were very ordinary people with ordinary abilities as well as ordinary weaknesses and sins. How could the Lord use them in such a tremendous and important task? But now all this was different; they were changed men. Now there was sureness and certainty about them. Now there was courage and strength where there had been weakness and cowardice. Now they understood spiritually and added maturity to their faith where before there were doubts and uncertainty. And what made the difference was the entrance of the Holy Spirit into their lives, for by the power of the Holy Spirit they were given power and courage and fire and zeal that nothing could ever quench or subdue.

Peter is a good example of this newfound courage and strength. When we look at his behavior on this fateful day, we see just how great a change had actually taken place within him. Here was a man who just a few weeks ago had shamefully denied His Lord, not once, but three times, and had done so at the slightest hint of danger. But now on Pentecost, we find him standing before the people of Jerusalem, proclaiming the resurrection of Christ the Crucified with such courage and conviction that on that day 3000 souls were converted and made members of the Church of Jesus Christ. This happened not only to Peter but to all the rest as well. The day of Pentecost was only the beginning.

Yes, Pentecost must come again. There is no question about it. We need a Pentecost, a real genuine Pentecost in our congregations today. We need a rebirth of the power and zeal and energy in our individual lives as well. Do you possess a Holy Spirit-conviction about Jesus Christ and His cause? Are you ready at any moment to give a witness of the hope that is within you?

As we look about ourselves in the church today, don't we see a general listlessness and indifference in those who like to call themselves the people of God? What about our mission to which the Lord has called us? There was a time when Christians were willing to face persecution and even death in order to proclaim the Gospel of the risen Christ, but now it is hard for us to get up enough nerve to invite our neighbor to come to church with us. There was a time when Christians freely gave to the Lord and His Church the first and best of all their income, but today we usually consider it a great sacrifice to give to the Lord something of what is left over after we have satisfied our own needs first.



ANTICIPATING THE CONFERENCE

In less than two weeks the Seventh Annual Conference of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations will be in session at our church headquarters near Minneapolis, Minnesota.

For the second time in seven years the AFLC will be going to that site to conduct its business. The other meeting was in 1965. At that time the property was relatively new to us. Now a fine three-story dormitory building, a garage and shop, and a dean's home also stand on the 21-acre plot of ground overlooking beautiful Medicine Lake in Plymouth Village. In addition, a house adjoining our property has been purchased with its lot.

In 1965 a seminary had been in operation for one year. This year our third graduating class will be ordained at the Conference. In 1965 there was thought about beginning a Bible School but no classes would be held for over one year. Today, three years have been put in and this past year approximately 45 students have been served.

Delegates to the Conference will be coming to a place where things have been happening, because of the interest and support and direction of the people in the congregations and a host of other interested friends scattered over the land. It is so easy to speak of outward aspects of growth. Of much more importance are the lives which have been moulded for Christ through the work of the schools. Remember, too, that the products of these institutions fan out into many communities as pastors or as other church members and the potential for good is tremendous.

Annual Conference 1969, will grapple with its problems, too. In the midst of a great possibility for expansion and a great need for the same (as witnessed by the plea in behalf of Home Missions in this issue), the Conference must try to determine for the whole Association the size of the financial support which can be reasonably expected by our common agencies such as schools, missions, etc. This is not a small matter. Doors of opportunity not only

stand ajar, but wide open. In light of that, what are we economically capable of assuming and maintaining? The task is not made any easier by the fact that no one knows just how many people claim membership in the Association.

The Conference will hear a report from the Property Ownership Study Committee recommending that the portions of the Minneapolis property used solely for educational purposes be transferred to the Seminary (Schools) Corporation. The Report was printed in the Ambassador on April 15. A request for discussion of the Report or related matters in the Ambassador has brought no response. This may be an indication that the Report has been favorably received. The Committee's findings also called for holding the Co-ordinating Committee (Corporation) at its present size. There is some doubt as to what that size is. The Rules for Work say seven members. The Articles of Incorporation allow up to nine. Presently there are seven members.

This will be a presidential election year at the Conference. Every three years this happens and a special interest is created because after all the choosing of a leader is of vital importance. There is an incumbent who is eligible for re-election. He has served from the beginning of the Association and knows the work, and the problems, of the church fellowship better than anyone else. At least two candidates must be nominated from the floor, as in the case for the positions of vice-president and secretary. The incumbents in the latter two offices must secure a three-fourths majority in order to continue in office since they have served three consecutive terms of one year.

Other highlights of the Annual Conference will be the dedication of the new dormitory building on Sunday afternoon, the ordination of four men into the ministry on Sunday morning, the greeting of returned missionaries from Brazil, Pastor and Mrs. John Abel, and the saying of farewell to new workers for that field, Pastor and Mrs. Connely Dyrud.

"Great is the Lord" will be the theme for the Conference. He has done great things for us, whereof we are glad. That He will do great things today, we can be sure. May He find us willing servants.

God give us a good Conference. Pray for His blessings.

BISHOP PIKE LEAVES THE CHURCH

There can only be commendation for Bishop James Pike in his decision to leave the Episcopal Church and thus the "organized church." He had shown for a long time by his statements of belief (or unbelief, if you prefer) and his own personal life that he did not belong in the church anymore. A man who has journeyed from one set of beliefs, or no beliefs, to another in his lifetime, the conviction gradually gripped him that he had better sever his connections with his church and we respect him for that.

One cannot help but agree with **some** of the things the former bishop says in his valedictory in **Look** magazine (April 29, 1969). He points out some of the hypocrisy pres-

ent in the church today. But who does not admit that there is hypocrisy in the organized church and deplores the fact? And the former bishop shows his own blind side when in the article he fails to admit the possibility that perhaps other people saw a bit of the hypocrite in him, too, when he moved about as a bishop of the church

of Jesus Christ while being involved in some very tangled marital affairs, to say nothing of his heretical convictions.

One can only hope and pray that James A. Pike, with his unquestionably searching and gifted mind, may one day find the peace which passes understanding and in simple faith rest in the work of Jesus on Calvary.



An idea occurred to me that could be a very rewarding way in which to raise money in a very special way for a worth while cause, the various branches of our AFLC, depending, of course, on how other members would respond to my suggestion.

The suggestion is simply this, that at any time or at various times we submit a favorite Bible verse, short poem, or some other appropriate short piece of satisfactory material and a donation of money in any amount in memory of a loved one, either a departed member of our own family or

of a dear friend. The material could be either a favorite of the one we wish to remember, or some favorite of our own. The donor should specify if the gift is for a specific department or for the General Fund.

Although this idea occurred to me some time ago, I am more enthused and encouraged that the idea could catch on and become very rewarding after having read the editorial "Time For Decision" in the April 1 publication of The Lutheran Ambassador.

I would like to start the ball rolling by donating five dollars to the General Fund, or wherever it is needed the most, in memory of my father and mother, J. Christ Nielsen—June 23, 1873—July 24, 1959, and Maria Nielsen—May 15, 1880—Dec. 17, 1965. They were members of Hope Lutheran church, Sisseton, S. Dak.

One favorite of mine is the story of the mustard seed, Mark 4:30—32. "What should we say God's kingdom is like," He asked, "or how should we picture it? It's like a mustard seed, which when sown in the ground is the smallest of all the seeds on earth. But when it's sown, it comes up and becomes the largest of all the garden plants. It grows such large branches that the birds in the air can make nests in its shade."

POTENTIAL UNLIMITED

What a thrill to read the financial reports of our AFLC-especially concerning the Bible School dormitory! What a thrill to see people take on a seemingly impossible task...and to see them give sacrificially with smiling faces and joyful hearts! When the Bible School was proposed. some sincerely felt that this little group known as the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations was biting off more than they could adequately chew "at that time!" But, because they trusted God and gave in the manner which was well pleasing to Him, not only is there a growing Bible School, but a dormitory.

All this shows that, if the mind can be properly challenged and the heart is in it, God can work marvels also today with human instruments. In all of this God hasn't changed; His will, His power, His desires, His promises, etc., remain the same. But He doesn't want us to just take care of the Bible School and Seminary facilities. He urges us to lift our eyes and see the fields white unto harvest! Often, when that verse is referred to, our minds' eyes see the heathen in some far off land, worshipping gods they make with their hands. But, we believe God wants us to see not only those heathen, but the heathen right close at hand.

Our missionaries (both foreign and domestic) challenge our hearts and minds with visions of opportunities that lie right at our doorsteps!

In raising funds for the dormitory, our dear departed friend and saint, Prof. George Soberg, used a term which really caught fire and gathered funds to build: that expression, through his quaint humor, was ONE GRAND FELLOWSHIP!

In looking at the primary project

of every Bible-believing, Christ-loving individual . . . that primary project must always be MISSIONS! Truly, as we look around us at the exploding metropolitan areas . . . we must call it POTENTIAL UNLIMITED. But, how can this potential be harnessed? In order to support foreign missions, our Bible School, our Seminary, etc., it is imperative that we home harness first our mission potential

The Home Missions is the newest member of the AFLC family of projects, but we recognize that it is actually the oldest and most important arm of the Christian Church. Because Home Missions is rather "new" to us, we find it receiving very little of our attention in our giving to God's work.

Any metropolitan area can somewhat duplicate similar figures, but these came from a Home Mission pastor serving on the West Coast, Pastor Robert Rieth, who serves the Seattle area. When we think about population explosions . . . we must mean the areas like Kent, Kirkland, Lake Stevens, Bothel, Burien, Auburn, etc. Just to give you an idea of growth, let's look at some figures. Five years ago at Kent, Washington there were 5000 to 7000 people . . . today, 17,000. Last year the school attendance increased 16.2% and this growth is projected well into 1975. It is called the "prime growth area of King County." The 15 large schools that now serve the area will have to increase to about 55 schools in order to educate the exploding population.

King County grew 75,000 people in 1967! It is impossible to get figures on the population—not even estimates.

But the need doesn't exist just in size, appalling as that is. The saddest part of the whole picture is that so

few attend church of the vast expanding multitude! Estimates vary from 10% to 27%.

Now let's look at Kirkland (where Pastor Rieth's church, Our Redeemer Lutheran, is located. The housing developments, Kingsgate-Highwoodlands, and Queensgate, were nonexistent four years ago. Today there are 1530 homes now occupied. The realtors say that by fall that will have increased to 2650 homes. Many other housing developments are experiencing the same exploding growth within the same area served by the church. A new elementary grade school, located one block from the mission church, now serves 663 pupils in an area that did not exist four years ago. Junior and Senior high students are bussed to other areas awaiting the completion of more schools. The population of the Kirkland area is now 58,100 people, which is an 8.7% increase each year since 1964.

Our Redeemer Lutheran Church began with two families served by Paul Jecklin in the summer of 1966, with the first service held the first Sunday in August 1966. That winter Pastor John De Boer, Steve Odegaard and Dale Christopherson served the group. Rev. Robert Rieth came in July of 1967 and began with five families at that time, with about 25 at worship services and 19 in Sunday School. Presently there are 20 families in membership with the average attendance about 70 in church and Sunday School.

Surely such opportunities must be seen as our primary mission in our AFLC. As this potential is developed and utilized, the outreach in ALL other areas of our church will receive the manpower and financial thrust which now is lying dormant!

POTENTIAL UNLIMITED is the cry of unreached millions and the sound of our responsibility to them.


Not long ago he had written a book named The Bible is the Word of God.
