ANOTHER NEW YEAR

As we begin this another New Year, I imagine we are looking at it with mixed emotions. Some of us are probably very apprehensive about it, others look upon it as a new challenge, a new opportunity for service.

I think that our attitude will be greatly affected by what we read, whom we listen to, and what we see. The newspapers, Time magazine, some TV programs, the general conversations we hear on the street can make us very apprehensive about the future, about life in general. On the other hand, God's Word, His people, and a close relationship with both can make life and the future a challenge, an opportunity, with the best as yet to come, namely heaven.

we have been given our church, we have been given a conscience that speaks within us, we have been given examples of certain people whom we respect, and we have been given the traditions of our homes. But most importantly, we have been given God's Word and the Holy Spirit.

Please, as you begin this New year, never think that you can get along without these things for guidance. We are only pilgrims, very helpless, children at best in this world.

3. There was also something in that window to give laughter. There was the child's funny book.

It is good to laugh, to relax. We must do so in this tension-filled world. I believe that God likes to see His people laugh together, have fun together, to praise God together in all things.

In 1978, no matter what happens to us, we can enjoy our relationship with God and the mercy and goodness He does shower upon us. We can also look forward to heaven, where all things will be perfect.

Learning, Guidance, Laughter are important ingredients for 1978 and all are found most completely in our Heavenly Father.

BOOK REVIEW

A Theology to Live By. Herman A. Preus, (St. Louis: Concordia Publishing House, 1977).

In the many books that have been written about the theology of Martin Luther, there have been a wide variety of interpretations. Luther often has appeared as his "interpreter" would like to see him. He has, therefore, become "all things to all men," depending on the theological persuasion of his reviewer.

Herman Preus has allowed Luther to speak for himself. And Luther needs to be heard by our generation. As those who identify ourselves as Lutherans in a day when there is such a broad spectrum of what is considered "Lutheran," it is good to hear from our namesake. In A Theology to Live By, we are given a fresh picture of authentic Lutheranism.

The book is divided into three major sections: Theologia Crucis (The Theology of the Cross), What is Man?, and The Christian Life-Its Dynamic and Destiny. Under these headings is presented an outline of basic Christian theology from the creation to immortality and the resurrection. Unlike some texts dealing with Bible doctrine. A Theology to Live By is true to its name in that there is practical application to everyday Christian living. Luther's doctrines are applied to today's Christian. Truth begs application and herein is the particular value of Dr. Preus' book.

At the outset. Dr. Preus shows the desire of Luther to see doctrine experienced and applied. In the early days of the Reformation, Luther warned against mere talk of Bible truth. "Dear friends, the kingdom of God-and we are that kingdom-does not consist in talk or words (I Cor. 4:20), but in activity, in deeds, in works and exercises. God does not want hearers and repeaters of words (James 1:22), but followers and doers, and this occurs in faith through love. For a faith without love is not enough -rather it is not faith at all, but a counterfeit of faith . . . " (p. 15). Dr. Preus comments that Luther "never ceased preaching that theologydoctrine, faith-must show itself in a Christian life" (p. 15).

There will be no true spiritual life,

however, unless that "life" is produced by the Gospel of grace. Luther's theology of grace alone, says Preus, is this—"God reaching out to raise up the fallen and condemned sinner.... It is God who calls man through a Gospel which has the power in it to draw the man it calls" (p. 97).

For Luther the Gospel is to be found faithfully recorded in the Holy Scriptures. Dr. Preus notes Luther's implicit trust in the veracity and historicity of Scripture. "Luther, with an intellect great enough to debate with Erasmus, had a faith humble enough to accept the Biblical account of the Fall, apple and all, rather than lose the fact in vague words like myth, allegory, fable, saga, symbolism, and the like" (p. 71). For Luther, Scripture is the infallible Word of God. "You should so deal with Scripture that you believe God Himself is speaking," says Luther (p. 27).

Dr. Preus reviews the clear, Biblical teaching of Luther on the doctrine of justification. At the same time, he notes the state of affairs in large segments of the Lutheran church today—"We theologians have made the doctrine so complex that even a world council of Lutheran scholars found it impossible to come up with a clear unified definition of the Reformation doctrine of justification" (p. 101). Preus is referring to the Lutheran World Federation meeting at Helsinki in 1963.

As mentioned, a chief aim of Dr. Preus' book is to show Luther's emphasis on application of theology to life. Yet, it is made clear that Luther cannot talk about sanctification without constant reference to justification. It is in the glorious truth of justification that both the power and the motivation to live a godly life are found (p. 121ff).

The Gospel comes to us in both Word and Sacrament according to Luther. "The Gospel of God's grace and love in Christ looms ever larger as Luther unfolds his doctrine of the sacraments" (p. 150). Dr. Preus observes Luther's explanation of Baptism. "Baptism is nothing else than the Word of God in the water, commanded by His institution, or, as Paul says, 'a washing in the Word'" (p. 152).

Among the several interesting

points brought out in Dr. Preus' delineation of the Lord's Supper as Luther understood it is the insistence on preparation for Communion. He based this on I Corinthians 11:28, "Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup." Luther believed the pastor is responsible to see that preparation is made. Dr. Preus notes some of the suggestions Luther made to implement this preparation.

The last chapter deals with Luther's views on immortality and resurrection. Dr. Preus contrasts the unbelief of liberal theologians regarding these truths with the unquestioning acceptance by Luther of the Bible's teaching. "The hope of heaven becomes to Luther the crowning element of faith" (p. 181).

I earnestly commend this book to every reader. It is a book that will be picked up again and again for information and inspiration. Concordia Publishing House is to be commended for making this fine text available. I thank God for the courage and forthrightness of Herman Preus in identifying himself solidly with the Biblebelieving, Christ-centered, crosscentered theology of Martin Luther.

LEM ANNOUNCES DETAILS OF MIDWINTER BIBLE CONFERENCE

"Outreach for Christ" will be the theme of the 42nd annual Midwinter Conference of the Lutheran Evangelistic Movement (L.E.M.), January 22-26. The conference will convene at Augustana Lutheran Church, 7th Street and 11th Avenue South, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Rev. Donald Ronning of Park River, N. Dak., will be the evening speaker, with services beginning on Sunday at 7:45 o'clock and continuing each evening through Thursday.

Day sessions will begin Monday with a 9:30 Prayer Hour, followed by a 10 a.m. Bible study led by Rev. Francis Monseth of Association Free Lutheran Bible School and Seminary of Medicine Lake (Minneapolis). His topic will be "Outreach of a Model Church," based on I Thessalonians.

The 11 o'clock hour will be led by Dr. Paul Rees, Editor-at-Large with World Vision International. Former pastor of First Covenant Church of Minneapolis, author of 14 books and a frequent conference and missionary rally speaker, he will speak from his experiences on the topic "Outreach to the World."

Afternoon speaker, at 1:30, Monday through Wednesday, will be Dr. Duane Gish of the Institute of Creation Research, San Diego, Calif. He will use as his topic "Creation or Evolution?" The LEM Skyways chaplains and The Living Dimension singers will be in charge of the Thursday afternoon session.

The conference will be preceded by sessions for youth at Northrop Auditorium, on the University of Minnesota campus, Friday evening and all day Saturday, January 20 and 21.

Rev. Laurel M. Udden, a pastor in the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations, is the director of the LEM.

THE WISE MAN

"I do not feel that we as parents can throw stones at other children or other parents until we as parents have completed our job and been successful." These words came resentfully from a lady who reluctantly accepted advice from her pastor concerning parental responsibility. In another instance a pastor had become much concerned for a man who was working from 7:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m., seven days a week, in his service station. "You ought to close your station on Sundays so that you can get some rest," advised the pastor. Upon hearing this advice, the man lost his temper and angrily replied, "It's always easy to tell another person how to run his business, isn't it?"

Both of these persons were unwilling to accept any advice, though in both cases they could have profited from it. How true are the words from the Bible, "Do not reprove a scoffer, or he will hate you; reprove a wise man, and he will love you." We show what sort of persons we are by the way we react to advice or reproof. All of us have heard it said of some individuals, "You can't tell him anything because he thinks he knows everything."

The person who accepts advice graciously is a wise man. Abraham Lincoln once said that he was willing to listen to anyone who could teach him anything. An employer remarked of a young man in his employ. "He is the most teachable man I've ever known." It is truly the mark of a wise man that he loves the reprover who tells him his fault. How can we love those who reprove us? By looking to

Jesus who, when He was reviled, did not revile in return. Are we wise men or scoffers? Do we love or hate those who reprove us?
