

Meditation Moments

WHAT KIND OF FATHER?

"And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Ephesians 6:4).

Father's Day is a day set aside to let fathers know we appreciate them and to show our love for them. As a mother is important to us, so are the fathers. They are more than just the one who brings home the paycheck, and what we really need are more Christian fathers to lead the family in the ways of the Lord.

Our text tells fathers not to provoke their children to wrath. There are those who, instead of leading toward the Lord, lead their children away. Or they may neglect the children and their needs as was evidenced in the film "A Time to Run." This showed the father so busy in his life that there was no time for the son. The son finally became so angry he left home. This is a good illustration of provoking a child to wrath. Though not all situations turn out the same, this story ends happily as the son receives Christ through his girl friend's encouragement.

Our text also tells fathers to bring their children up in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord." This, of course, means that a father must be in a right relationship with Jesus Himself. How can one who has not tasted of the Lord do what Paul tells fathers they should do? If a father is to lead in this way, he must be a personal example of faith. A child is quick to observe the father's behavior. In fact, many times a son will be found imitating the father.

One of the best ways for a father to show that he loves the Lord is to put Him first in his life. The basic concern is having a love for God's house and the place the Word of God has. The Word of God is the basic source of strength in living for Christ. By observing his father reading the Bible, a child will see this is very important. Are you the first to take the lead in reading and going to hear God's Word, or is it easier to stay away from God?

A father can either be a leader in nurturing in the faith or can stand in the way. I remember my father telling of the example of a father standing in the way. A speaker was in a certain town and a boy went to hear him. The message moved the lad to see his need. He came to talk to the speaker and related his desire to receive Christ but felt it unnecessary since his father did not deem it important. The speaker quickly got in touch with this father and told the son's story of his non-interest in these needs. The next service found the father taking the lead to the altar when the invitation was given. Behind him came the son. Fathers, is your example standing in the way of your child coming? Or can you say that you are pointing them to the Lord Jesus who loves them and desires to save them?

The best father is one who is obedient to the Lord. Abraham is the best example of real dedication. He was willing to give up his son of promise. We may not be called on to this extent, but we are to be obedient to God's word and its dictates. A father cannot expect a son or daughter to be obedient to him if he first is not willing to be obedient to the Lord Jesus. The Word of God is where the nurture and admonition of the Lord are to be found.

It is not possible to do what is right unless there is a full trust in the Lord. In Proverbs 3:5-6, it says, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths." If a father does not trust the Lord with all his heart, how can he expect his children to. A father must acknowledge the Lord and God will direct the path each day in the life of the father.

What kind of a father are you today? Are you leading in God's ways? May we pray for more fathers committed to Christ and thank God especially for all Christian fathers.







AFTER 25 YEARS— A TIME TO GIVE THANKS

It is now almost 40 years since the first efforts were made in the Thief River Falls District of the Lutheran Free Church to conduct summer Bible camps for the young people. The first Bible Camp was held at the Covenant Camp Grounds at Warren in June, 1939. Our Bible Camps were conducted at this camp for several years.

As time went on, it became evident that a camp located in the district would be desirable and at the Luther League Convention, November 2, 1947, it was decided to study the possibility of building a camp in the Thief River Falls District. A committee composed of all the pastors of the district and one layman from each parish was appointed to make plans and recommendations for such a camp. Rev. E. Raaum, George Norum and Levin Vagle served successively as chairman of this committee. After considerable study, serious deliberations, and earnest prayer, it was decided to build a camp near Lake Bronson on a site donated by Mr. and Mrs. Vagle. Meanwhile, we continued to

conduct camps each summer, renting Bethany Lutheran Bible Camp on beautiful Grace Lake, east of Bemidji, Minnesota, for four years, 1949 through 1952. In 1953 we used Lake of the Woods Lutheran Bible Camp near Baudette. Minnesota.

On May 19, 1952, the Articles of Incorporation were approved and there was held an election of officers. In a very short time construction designs were accepted and the building of a camp became a serious undertaking. August 31, 1953, was a day of rejoicing when the cornerstone for the first building of our own camp was laid. From 1954 and on our camp has been held at our own Galilee Bible Camp. The Bible Camp now consists of a dining hall and kitchen, spacious chapel, two dormitories, cooks' cabin, speakers' cabin, pastors' cabin and a bath house. At present, a custodian's house is under construction.

When the Lutheran Free Church ceased to function as such, the Galilee Bible Camp was also affected. In 1974, the members of the corporation voted to turn the responsibilities of

the camp over to the churches in the district belonging to the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations. As a result there was a change in the Articles of Incorporation. Because the camp acres are within the Lake Bronson State Park, we were asked to sell some of the original 31.14 acres to the state of Minnesota. In return we also benefited when a new road was constructed in the park. This will be the third successive year that the Family Camp of the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations will assemble at Galilee Bible Camp, Aug. 8-14.

As we think of the many who have sacrificed and labored faithfully in building this camp for our district, we are reminded of the words in Nehemiah 4:6: "So built we the wall.... for the people had a mind to work."

May the Lord continue to lead, guide and direct the work at Galilee Bible Camp and may many precious souls be won and kept for Jesus Christ. May He reward and bless all who have had a part, large or small, in conducting each camp week and in erecting this beautiful Galilee Bible Camp. Thanks to all who have caught the vision and labored in this phase of God's Kingdom.

Because this year marks 25 years since the Articles of Incorporation for Galilee Bible Camp were approved, the board feels that a day of thanksgiving would be in order. On Sunday afternoon, June 26, at 2:30 p.m., we will meet at Galilee Bible Camp to praise the Lord for blessing us these 25 years. The board extends an invitation to everyone to be present with us at this joyful event. A special invitation is extended to all former campers. Let's make this a Reunion Day at Galilee Bible Camp. There will be a fellowship program with refreshments to follow.

AN OBJECT LESSON

"My son, give me thy heart!" (Proverbs 23:26).

They had just had family devotions. The father had just read the very same words from the Scriptures that we have just heard. When the devotions were concluded, she went over to her father and said: "What do we do when we give God our hearts?"

"That I shall tell you; but first go and get your little purse."

Randi was very willing to do that because every time her father asked her to go and get her purse he put some money into it. When Randi returned with her purse, her father put a whole dollar into it. Randi beamed with joy. At that moment she probably forgot her question completely.

But her father had not forgotten it. Now he spoke up: "You asked me just now how we give God our hearts. Then I asked you to go and get your purse. You did, and gave it to me. It was empty and I put a dollar into it. That is the way we give God our hearts. It is empty of all that God would have it contain. But then God takes our empty hearts and fills them. And do you know with what He fills them?"

Randi sat and looked at her father with large eyes. She really did not know what she should answer.

"Well," said her father, "He puts Jesus into our hearts. Remember that you received Jesus into your heart when you were a wee little child. When you were baptized, Jesus came into your heart."

"And will He never leave me?" asked Randi.

"No," said her father. "He does not want to leave you. But He must depart from many hearts. For if we do anything that we know is sinful and we refuse to ask Jesus to forgive us, then Jesus cannot stay in our hearts any longer."

Randi understood this. And she was glad that she, too, could give her heart to Jesus.

Sometimes fathers abdicate their responsibilities as leaders even though they continue to live in the house. It is unfortunate when the mother has to assume a dual role in such cases. It is not the God-ordained way.

Many fathers do fulfill their responsibility to wife and children. The thought of such evokes good feeling and thanksgiving. What a force for good and for healthful development when a father is a good example for his children and shows them God's way by walking in it himself.

Fathers, we honor you today. We thank you for what you mean to us. Always remember the great responsibility which is yours. Ask the Lord to help you to meet it.

TEN YEARS AGO AT FARGO

It is ten years ago since the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations last met in Fargo, gateway to the West, in annual conference. One other conference was held there, the first regular one, in 1963.

But what happened at Fargo ten years ago? Perhaps a backward look over that span of time will help us to see where we have come as a church fellowship.

The dominating item of business at that conference was the decision to build a dormitory for girls at the new Bible School (begun in 1966) in Minneapolis. The cost of the building, together with the garage, was estimated at \$200,000, apart from the furnishings. The dormitory

would house male students, too, until other accommodations could be made for them. \$75,000 was to be raised before construction could begin. Toward that end a thrust called "One Grand Fellowship" (gifts of \$1,000) was begun, spearheaded by the late Prof. George Soberg. Many such gifts came in at the conference itself.

That dormitory was built and was occupied in September, 1968. Subsequently, a dormitory for boys was erected also and occupied in October, 1974. For the present, we have adequate facilities, although the smaller boys' dorm was taxed to capacity this past winter. But, ten years later, a considerable debt remains on both dorms. This year's conference must wrestle with the problem of materially and systematically reducing those debts before further building needs arise at the Schools.

It was reported to that conference that 11 congregations had affiliated with the AFLC during the year. All of them continue as active congregations in the fellowship. Their admission brought the total of churches in the AFLC to about 91. Today the roster numbers about 130, so there has been progress in that area, although it has slowed noticeably in the last couple years.

In his report to the church, Rev. John P. Strand bemoaned the pastoral shortage. He saw the need for pastors, missionaries and teachers. Ten years later the situation remains much the same, although two or three years hence the shortage could be much less than it is today. President Strand pointed out to the conference in Fargo that up to that time the AFLC president had not been able to devote full time to that office. That situation has changed for the better, but now and again he has had to help out with Seminary or even Bible School teaching.

The 1967 Annual Conference also established the name of the Bible School to be "Association Lutheran Bible School." A later conference added the word "Free" to the name.

We notice, in looking back in the records, that we lamented editorially after the conference that congregational representation was not all that good. A third of them were not represented by a lay delegate and of the two-thirds represented, they were not all together at any one conference session. We pointed out that the freedom of the congregation involves the freedom not to be represented at an annual conference. "But," we asked, "why does this situation exist? Is this the exercise of responsible freedom?"

And that situation still exists at our conferences, we are afraid, and the question is still pertinent. Here is a place and a time to urge full congregational representation at the 15th Annual Conference in Fargo. It is the Lord's work we are about. Let us be every bit as concerned about the representation of the local units as we are for organizations such as the American Legion, Farmers' Union, Farm Bureau, Kiwanis, etc. We should be more concerned, but we'll start with this.

God give us good days in Fargo and may we dedicate ourselves to the reviewal of our work and the making of the hard decisions (the necessary decisions) which will enable us to move forward in a God-honoring way in Godpleasing work.
